Kaila Tatman and Stephen Galloway Outstanding 4-H Award

The awards are sponsored by the Chestnut Grove 4-H Club. The Outstanding 4-H Boy Award is sponsored in memory of Mr. and Mrs. Cliff Huffnal, the founders of the Chestnut Grove 4-H Club, and the Outstanding 4-H Girl is given in memory of Lisa K. Martin, an active member and President of the Chestnut Grove 4-H Club.

The winners were selected from applications that were submitted to the Kent County 4-H Office. The basis of their selection was the 4-H'ers project work accomplishments, county and local leadership, citizenship, and overall involvement in the 4-H program.

Kaila has been active in several 4-H project areas including clothing & textiles, woodworking, foods, public presentation, citizenship and leadership.
