Introduction to Social & Cultural Anthropology (ANTH 101)— 3 CREDITS*

Use of ethnographic data and film to illustrate the anthropologist's view of societies in their sociocultural & ecological dimensions.

Introduction to Biological Anthropology (ANTH 102)— 3 CREDITS

Genetic basis for human evolution.

Introduction to Prehistoric Archaeology (ANTH 103)— 3 CREDITS

The history of archaeology, methods of fieldwork and artifact analysis, and theories of human behavior in archaeological research.

Introduction to Archaeology and Biological Anthropology (ANTH 104)—3 CREDITS

The fossil and archaeological record of human biological and cultural evolution.

Introduction to Criminal Justice (CRJU 110)—3 CREDITS

Responses in American society to the problems of crime.

Problems of Criminal Judiciary (CRJU 202)—3 CREDITS

Focuses on problems and issues found in the American criminal court system.

Problems of Corrections (CRJU 203) – 3 CREDITS

General overview of the American corrections system and a survey of the most pressing correctional problems of the twenty-first century.

Introductory Microeconomics (ECON 151)—3 CREDITS

Introduces supply and demand concepts, examines models of perfect and imperfect competition, and the determination of product price and quantities.

Physical Geography (GEOG 101)—3 CREDITS

Introduction to processes responsible for weather, climate and climatic change.

Human Geography (GEOG 102)—3 CREDITS*

Examination of the spatial distribution of human activities worldwide.

World Regional Geography (GEOG 120)—3 CREDITS*

Introduction to the geographic regions of the world and the changing relations between regions.

Introduction to Cultural Geography (GEOG 203)— 3 CREDITS*

Introductory study of people, landscapes and cultures through time.

Western Civilization to 1648 (HIST 101)—3 CREDITS

The principal political, social economic, and cultural developments in Western Civilization.

Western Civilization: 1648 - Present (HIST 102)—3 CREDITS

The principal political, social economic, and cultural developments in Western Civilization since the middle of the 17th century.

World History I (HIST 103)—3 CREDITS*

Principal political, economic, cultural and social developments in world history through the sixteenth century.

World History II (HIST 104)—3 CREDITS*

Principal political, economic, cultural and social developments in world history from the sixteenth century to the present.

US History (HIST 205)—3 CREDITS

An introductory survey of 17th, 18th & 19th century U.S. history.

US History (HIST 206)—3 CREDITS

An introductory survey of American History since 1865.

American Civil Rights Movement (HIST 220)—3 CREDITS

History of American Civil Rights Movement from 1954 to 1970; examines history of American race relations.

Philosophies of Life (PHIL 100)—3 CREDITS

Survey of selected past and present philosophies that people strive to live by.

Social & Political Philosophy (PHIL 201)—3 CREDITS

Issues related to government, wealth and individual's rights, liberties and obligations to obey the law.

Contemporary Moral Problems (PHIL 202)—3 CREDITS

The application of philosophical techniques to contemporary moral problems.

American Political System (POSC 150)—3 CREDITS

Constitutional principles, structure, and functions of the political process in the U.S.

Introduction to International Relations (POSC 240)— 3 CREDITS

The development of international systems, their structure and political economic dynamics.

General Psychology (PSYC 100)—3 CREDITS

Foundation in the application of the scientific method to problems of human behavior and experience.

Introduction to Sociology (SOCI 201)—3 CREDITS

An overview of the sociological perspective of the study of society, social organization and social institutions.

Introduction to Women's Studies (WOMS 201)— 3 CREDITS*

Study of the causes and conditions determining women's status in society.
